Learning Together



Academic Programme: Year 9

In Year 9 the essential learning areas are covered in the interests of a broad and balanced education.

All Year 9 students study:

- **Compulsory** – English, Mathematics, Science, Social Studies, Physical Education and Health
- **Technology** – 1/4 year of each of the following: Food Technology, Technology Mechanical - Metal, Technology Construction - Wood, Graphics.
- **The Arts** – trimester of each over the year: Art, Music, Drama

plus the choice of

- **Languages** – choice of one for an all-year course: French, Māori

OR

Future Skills – complete three over the year: Financial Literacy, Environmental Studies, Digital Literacy, Literacy Enhancement.





The Right Pathway for Every Student

We believe that every young man should be able to achieve to his full potential. To develop a base of knowledge and skills, it's important that boys in Years 9 and 10 are exposed to the full range of Learning Areas in the NZ Curriculum. From Year 11, however, we offer students more choices as they begin to decide on their learning pathway (see Curriculum guide on next page). Students are guided by their form teacher, subject teachers and Deans to ensure the most appropriate choices are made.



Teachers at TBHS have high expectations for all students. Our motto is *Scientia Potestas est* or *Ma te Maturanga te Mana* (Knowledge is Power) and this emphasis on the importance of learning underpins every lesson and every activity. Boys learn best when they learn alongside their peers and feel supported and safe. Our teachers understand the importance of *manaakitanga* and they create welcoming classroom environments that are conducive to learning.

The academic achievement at Timaru Boys' High School is consistently higher than the national average in NCEA and University Entrance. We have a highly qualified and resourceful group of teachers in all areas of our school curriculum. TBHS is large enough to support and develop students on a wide range of academic and vocational pathways. We offer an extensive choice of senior academic subjects (including 4 senior Science subjects), but we also have extremely large Technology and Careers departments which help boys develop the skills and knowledge required for a trades-based or work-based future. Learning takes place in modern, well resourced classrooms and stunning outdoor spaces, such as our all weather turf and swimming pool.

Student Wellbeing

All boys are treated as unique individuals and the support they receive for their learning and development is personalised. Our pastoral care begins with the Vertical Form Teacher, who gets to really know and understand each of their form students over a number of years. This support is augmented by the Deans and the Counsellor who offer professional support and guidance when required.

We place great emphasis on the key transition stages in a boy's life. The Mana Tāngata Programme, which all Year 10 students undergo, is a wonderful spiritual and physical experience which marks the journey from adolescence to manhood. Students work through lessons and tasks which challenge them to think about their place in the world and to question some of their assumptions in a completely safe and supportive environment. It's also lots of fun! The 'solo' sleep-out in the bush is something every student remembers long after they have walked through

the Boys' High gates for the last time. This process of development is continued in Year 11 (White Shirt Induction Day), Year 12 (POWER Tools) and Year 13 (POWER Pack)

The Learning Support Department at TBHS is staffed by highly trained teachers and teacher aides who focus on any learning, social or behaviour needs students may have. They work with teachers to ensure all students can operate at their potential. There are also many other avenues of support for our students - Careers Advisers, Attendance staff, Kaiwhina Maori, Prefects, Peer Support students and the Public Health Nurse. Actually, all teachers and support staff are involved in student wellbeing and pastoral care - it's a community and we want our teenagers to develop into well-adjusted, happy, confident, caring, young men.

An Education for Life

A student's school years are not just about qualifications. We want boys to learn how to work productively with others and to accept people as they are. These life skills are best taught and tested in the supportive and fun environments of extra-curricular activities in sport, culture and service.

We are a middle sized school, but the range of choices we offer in sport is huge. We are regionally and nationally competitive in all the traditional summer and winter codes, and we are always looking for opportunities to establish new sports that will engage our boys. Success in competitions is definitely important, but sport offers so much more than the chance to win. Boys learn resilience and the joy of shared endeavours and shared experiences - skills, memories and relationships that will stay with them for the rest of their lives.

At TBHS, we believe that exposure to artistic and cultural activities are fundamental to a boy's development into a thinking adult. These experiences are embedded in our school curriculum and our extra-curricular programme. Not everyone will become an artist but we can all be enriched by activities such as Arts Week, Cultural Extravaganza, drama and musical productions, Kapa Haka, Theatre Sports, the TBHS Ball, etc.

No school career is complete without a visit to John Scott Lodge, at the top of Lake Tekapo on Godley Peaks Station and was gifted to us by Bruce Scott in 1984. All Year 9 classes spend a week up in that beautiful, rarefied place, taking turns to provide the evening meal, learning bushcraft, fishing, canoeing on the Godley River, playing mud rugby and having enormous fun. Many boys return in Year 13 as Peer Support Leaders who accompany the Year 9 classes. John Scott Lodge is a truly wonderful place which provides our students with a new appreciation of the grandeur and beauty of nature.
